Admission Policies

Grants Pass Seventh-day Adventist School does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national or ethnic origin in their administration policies, scholarships, and other school-administered activities and programs.

All students must present a transcript of previous schoolwork or the equivalent upon entering Grants Pass Seventh-day Adventist School for the first time. If no such evidence is presented, the student will be tested to determine proper grade placement.

Students registering after the start of the school year will begin classes on the Monday after registration papers have been turned in and/or a meeting held with the Admissions Committee.
