Requirements for 0a. RETURNING TO IN-PERSON INSTRUCTION

- Not later than the week of March 29, 2021 all public elementary schools must operate
 in either an On-Site or Hybrid Instructional Model when they meet the specified county
 health metrics in the chart on page 15 (green and yellow rows in the chart in Section
 Ob).
 - A general allowance will be provided if the school has communicated a plan to families and staff with a start date on or before the week of April 5, 2021 and is using the week of March 29, 2021 to train staff for a return to in-person instruction.
 - A general allowance will be provided if the school has a published calendar that shows they are not in session the week of March 29, 2021 and has communicated a plan to families and staff with a start date on or before the week of April 12, 2021 and is using the week of April 5, 2021 to train staff for a return to in-person instruction.
 - A general allowance will be provided if the school is closed to in-person instruction due to a decision made in partnership with a local public health

- authority or the Oregon Health Authority to move to Comprehensive Distance Learning to address active transmission within a school.
- Any school not meeting this requirement will be reviewed and may result in loss of eligibility to receive state school funds or other enforcement as prescribed by Governor Brown's Executive Order 21-06.
- Not later than the week of April 19, 2021 all public middle and high schools must operate in either an On-Site or Hybrid Instructional Model when they meet the specified county health metrics in the chart on page 15 (green row in the chart in Section 0b).
 - A general allowance will be provided if the school has communicated a plan to families and staff with a start date on or before the week of April 26, 2021 and is using the week of April 19, 2021 to train staff for a return to in-person instruction.
 - A general allowance will be provided if the school has a published calendar that shows they are not in session the week of April 19, 2021 and has communicated a plan to families and staff with a start date on or before the week of May 3, 2021 and is using the week of April 26, 2021 to train staff for a return to inperson instruction.
 - A general allowance will be provided if the school is closed to in-person instruction due to a decision made in partnership with a local public health authority or the Oregon Health Authority to move to Comprehensive Distance Learning to address active transmission within a school.
 - Any school not meeting this requirement will be reviewed and may result in loss of eligibility to receive state school funds or other enforcement as prescribed by Governor Brown's <u>Executive Order 21-06</u>.
- The requirement to offer On-Site or Hybrid Instructional Models does not apply to virtual charter schools as defined in ORS 338.005 or a public school that has a permanent instructional model that is predominantly through online courses.
- Public schools may transition a portion or all of the school to Comprehensive Distance Learning when responding in partnership with a local public health authority or the Oregon Health Authority to control active transmission of COVID-19 in the school setting.
- Public schools may transition a portion or all of the school to Comprehensive Distance Learning when they are operating in a county whose metrics place it in the operational status represented by the red row in the chart in section 0b. Public middle and high schools may transition a portion or all of the school to Comprehensive Distance Learning when they are operating in a county whose metrics place it in the operational status represented by the red or yellow row in the chart in section 0b. - The school testing program offers an additional risk-mitigation strategy that is relatively low-burden and can help offset impacts of operating when community spread is higher even if school transmission is low/absent and RSSL protocols are firmly in place. This requirement applies anytime a school is operating in an Instructional Model that is not aligned with the county metrics case data. This is true whether your school began operating in August/September, or took a pause, or opened on January 4, or is just opening for the first time.
- The testing program is for students in grades kindergarten and up and school staff. The program does not include early learning programs.
- Registering for the testing program includes a self-attestation that the program will be offered. Please accept the responsibility to offer the program when you register.
- If your school is operating an On-Site or Hybrid Instructional Model, the school also must provide a distance learning option for students and families that choose to remain off-site. Requirements for 1a. COMMUNICABLE DISEASE MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR COVID-19

- Conduct a risk assessment as required by OSHA administrative rule <u>OAR 437-001-0744(3)(g)</u>.

- Implement measures to limit the spread of COVID-19 within the school setting, including when the school setting is outside a building.
- Update written Communicable Disease Management Plan to specifically address the prevention
 of the spread of COVID-19. Examples are located in the <u>Oregon School Nurses Association</u>
 (OSNA) COVID-19 Toolkit.

- Protocol to record/keep daily logs to be used for contact tracing for a minimum of four weeks to assist the LPHA as needed.
 - See supplemental guidance on LPHA/school partnering on contact tracing.
 - o Refer to OHA Policy on Sharing COVID-19 Information
- Process to ensure that all itinerant and all district staff (maintenance, administrative, delivery, nutrition, and any other staff) who move between buildings keep a log or calendar with a running four-week history of their time in each school building and who they were in contact with at each site.
- Process to ensure that the school reports to and consults with the LPHA regarding cleaning and possible classroom or program closure if anyone who has entered school is diagnosed with COVID-19.

Communicable Disease Management Plan for COVID-19:

An employee risk assessment will be conducted as required by OSHA administrative rule $\underline{OAR\ 437-001}$ $\underline{0744(3)(g)}$.

Grants Pass Adventist School (GPAS) has an updated Communicable Disease School Management Plan addressing the prevention and spread of COVID-19. The principal will be the designated person to establish, implement and enforce physical distancing requirements, consistent with the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance and other guidance from OHA.

Local Public Health Authority (LPHA) contact: Michael Weber is the Director of the Josephine County Public Health Department, which will provide support and resources. His phone number is 541-474-5325. We will notify his office of any confirmed COVID-19 cases among students or staff. The school

administrative assistant will report to the Local Public Health Authority (LPHA) any cluster of any illness among staff or students. The school will cooperate with the LPHA recommendations and provide all logs and information in a timely manner.

Training: We plan to train all staff in sections 1-3 of the Ready Schools, Safe Learners at a staff meeting on August 18, 2020 either virtually or in-person.

Systematic Disinfection: The custodian will systematically disinfect classrooms, common areas, offices, table surfaces, bathrooms, and activity areas daily. A cold fogger machine will be used to disinfect surfaces in classrooms, offices, bathrooms, and activity areas daily with a bleach water solution approved by the CDC. The teachers will disinfect high-touch areas of classrooms at other times of the school day.

Screening: All students and staff will be screened for symptoms (see section 1f) on entry to the school every day, either visually by the staff and/or with confirmation from a parent/caregiver/guardian. Anyone displaying or reporting the primary symptoms of concern will be isolated in the infirmary room or another designated room, and be sent home as soon as possible.

Communication Letter: A letter will be developed and sent out via email, text, or Remind to communicate with students, families, and staff who have come into close contact with a confirmed case.

Daily student/cohort logs: The school will use daily student attendance and sign-in/out records for the purpose of student/cohort contact tracing. Parent/guardian names and emergency contact information is stored in the school's Student Information System (SIS) database. All staff (including itinerant staff, substitutes, and guest teachers) names and phone numbers who interact with a stable cohort or individual student will be logged daily. The main office will record/keep daily logs to be used for contact tracing for a minimum of four weeks to assist the LPHA as needed.

Reporting to the LPHA: The school administration will report to and consult with the LPHA regarding cleaning and possible classroom or program closure if anyone who has entered school is diagnosed with COVID-19.

Response to Potential Outbreaks: The staff will follow the school's outbreak response protocol as described in the *GPAS Communicable Disease School Management Plan* and coordinate with the LPHA for any outbreak response.

Requirements for 1b. HIGH-RISK POPULATIONS

Serve students in high-risk population(s) whether learning is happening through On-Site
(including outside), Hybrid (partially On-Site and partially Comprehensive Distance Learning
models), or Comprehensive Distance Learning models.

Medically Fragile, Complex and Nursing-Dependent Student Requirements

- All districts must account for students who have health conditions that require additional nursing services. Oregon law (<u>ORS 336.201</u>) defines three levels of severity related to required nursing services:
 - Medically Complex: Are students who may have an unstable health condition and who may require daily professional nursing services.
 - Medically Fragile: Are students who may have a life-threatening health condition and who may require immediate professional nursing services.

- Nursing-Dependent: Are students who have an unstable or life-threatening health condition and who require daily, direct, and continuous professional nursing services.
- Review <u>Supplemental Guidance on Community and Health Responsibilities Regarding FAPE in Relation to IDEA During CDL and Hybrid.</u>
- Staff and school administrators, in partnership with school nurses, or other school health providers, should work with interdisciplinary teams to address individual student needs. The school registered nurse (RN) is responsible for nursing care provided to individual students as outlined in ODE guidance and state law:
 - Communicate with parents and health care providers to determine return to school status and current needs of the student.
 - Coordinate and update other health services the student may be receiving in addition to nursing services. This may include speech language pathology, occupational therapy, physical therapy, as well as behavioral and mental health services.
 - Modify Health Management Plans, Care Plans, IEPs, or 504 or other student-level medical plans, as indicated, to address current health care considerations.
 - The RN practicing in the school setting should be supported to remain up to date on current guidelines and access professional support such as evidence-based resources from the Oregon School Nurses Association.
 - Service provision should consider health and safety as well as legal standards.
 - Appropriate medical-grade personal protective equipment (PPE) should be made available to nurses and other health providers.
 - o Work with an interdisciplinary team to meet requirements of ADA and FAPE.
 - High-risk individuals may meet criteria for exclusion during a local health crisis.
 - o Refer to updated state and national guidance and resources such as:
 - U.S. Department of Education Supplemental Fact Sheet: Addressing the Risk of COVID-19 in Preschool, Elementary and Secondary Schools While Serving Children with Disabilities from March 21, 2020.
 - ODE guidance updates for Special Education. Example from March 11, 2020.
 - OAR 581-015-2000 Special Education, requires districts to provide 'school health services and school nurse services' as part of the 'related services' in order 'to assist a child with a disability to benefit from special education.'
 - OAR 333-019-0010 Public Health: Investigation and Control of Diseases: General Powers and Responsibilities, outlines authority and responsibilities for school exclusion.

Plan Details for 1b.

High-Risk Populations: The school will account for students who have health conditions that require additional nursing services pursuant to Oregon law ORS 336.201. Staff and school administrators will work with interdisciplinary teams to address individual student needs. The school does not have a school registered nurse on staff. The staff and school administrators will communicate with parents to determine return to school status and current needs of the student. Service provision will consider health and safety as well as legal standards. High-risk individuals may meet criteria for exclusion during a local health crisis.

Requirements for 1c. PHYSICAL DISTANCING

- Elementary Level: Support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining at least 3 feet between students to the maximum extent possible.
- Middle and High School Level when at a county case rate of <200 (green level on the metrics chart in Section 0): Support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining at least 3 feet between students to the maximum extent possible.
- Middle and High School Level when at a county case rate of ≥200 (yellow and red levels on the metrics chart in Section 0): Support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining at least 6 feet between students to the maximum extent possible.
- All Levels: Support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining 6 feet between staff at all times and 6 feet between staff and students to the maximum extent possible.
- Consider physical distancing requirements when determining room capacity. Calculate only with
 usable classroom space, understanding that desks and room set-up will require use of all space
 in the calculation. Additional space for entry, exit, and movement within classroom should be
 considered. This also applies for professional development and staff gatherings.
- Within this design, consider minimum space for educators to have their own space in the learning environment and allow for the educator to move through the room efficiently and carefully while maintaining 6 feet of physical distance between the educator and the student to the maximum extent feasible.
- Minimize time standing in lines and take steps to ensure that required distance between students is maintained, including marking spacing on floor, one-way traffic flow in constrained spaces, etc.
- Schedule modifications to limit the number of students in the building or outside learning space (e.g., rotating groups by days or location, staggered schedules to avoid hallway crowding and gathering).
- Plan for students who will need additional support in learning how to maintain physical distancing requirements. Provide instruction; don't employ punitive discipline.
- Staff must maintain physical distancing during all staff meetings and conferences, or consider remote web-based meetings.

Plan Details for 1c.

Physical Distancing: Physical distancing will be supported in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining at least 3 feet between students to the maximum extent possible.

The staff will stress physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining six feet between staff and students to the maximum extent possible.

Physical distancing requirements will be considered when determining room capacity. Only usable classroom space will be used in the calculations, knowing that desks and room set-up will require use of all space in the calculation to determine room capacity. Additional space for entry, exit, and movement within the classroom will be considered. This also applies for professional development and staff gatherings.

Within this design, consider minimum space for educators to have their own space in the learning environment and allow for the educator to move through the room efficiently and carefully while maintaining 6 feet of physical distance between the educator and the student to the maximum extent feasible will be considered.

To ensure that the required distance between students is maintained to the maximum extent possible, Velcro carpet spot markers have been set in the hallways, the Commons, and the area leading to the gym for two-way traffic flow. The teachers will minimize time students are standing in lines and take steps to maintain physical distancing when in lines. Yellow duct tape lines space six feet apart have been applied outside on the sidewalks leading up to the main entrance and the preschool, grades 3-5, and grades 6-8 classroom doors.

Six feet of physical distancing in common areas such as the hallways, the Commons, the gym, and the area leading to the gym will be maintained. Six feet of physical distancing between cohorts of any level (K-8) will be maintained.

Recess and PE schedules will be staggered to avoid hallway crowding and gathering. If lockers are used, the students will be released on a staggered schedule to maintain physical distancing. Students in preschool, grades 3-5, and grades 6-8 will eat their snacks/lunches in their classrooms rather than together in the Commons. Grades K-2 will eat their lunches in the Commons.

Teachers will train their students on methods for maintaining physical distance requirements and its importance.

Requirements for 1d. COHORTING

- Establish stable cohorts:
 - The smaller the cohort, the less risk of spreading disease. As cohort groups increase in size, the risk of spreading disease increases.
- Each school must have a system for daily logs to ensure contract tracing among the cohort(s) (see section 1a).
- Minimize interaction between students in different stable cohorts (e.g., access to restrooms, activities, common areas). Provide access to All Gender/Gender Neutral restrooms.
- Cleaning and sanitizing surfaces (e.g., desks, dry erase boards, door handles, etc.) must be maintained between multiple student uses, even in the same cohort.
- Design cohorts such that all students (including those protected under ADA and IDEA) maintain access to general education, grade-level academic content standards, and peers.
- Minimize the number of staff that interact with each cohort to the extent possible, staff who interact with multiple stable cohorts must wash/sanitize their hands between interactions with different stable cohorts.
- Elementary staff who interact with multiple cohorts (music, PE, library, paraprofessionals who
 provide supervision at recesses, etc.) should have schedules altered to reduce the number of
 cohorts/students they interact within a week. Consider having these staff engage via
 technology, altering duties so that they are not in close contact with students in multiple
 cohorts, or adjust schedules to reduce contacts.

Plan Details for 1d.

Cohorting: A cohort is a group of people banded together or treated as a group. Stable cohort groups will be established by their classroom designation where feasible: preschool, grades K-2, grades 3-5, and grades 6-8. Daily attendance and sign-in/out records will serve as daily logs to provide contract tracing among the cohorts. Interaction between students in different stable cohorts will be minimized. On Fridays, all-school chapels will be delivered through Zoom meetings with the cohorts remaining in their classrooms or with regular classroom worships rather than with an all-school chapel period.

Cleaning and sanitizing surfaces (e.g., desks, dry erase boards, door handles, etc.) will be maintained between multiple student uses, even in the same cohort.

The number of staff that interact with each cohort will be minimized to the extent possible. Staff who interact with multiple stable cohorts must wash/sanitize their hands between interactions with different stable cohorts.

Requirements for 1e. PUBLIC HEALTH COMMUNICATION AND TRAINING

- Communicate to staff at the start of On-Site instruction and at periodic intervals explaining infection control measures that are being implemented to prevent spread of disease.
- Offer initial training to all staff prior to being in-person in any instructional model. Training could be
 accomplished through all staff webinar, narrated slide decks, online video, using professional
 learning communities, or mailing handouts with discussion. Training cannot be delivered solely
 through the sharing or forwarding information electronically or in paper copy form as this is an
 insufficient method for ensuring fidelity to public health protocols (see section 8b for specific
 training requirements). Note: Instructional time requirements allow for time to be devoted for
 professional learning that includes RSSL training.
- Post "COVID -19 Hazard Poster" and "Masks Required" signs as required by OSHA administrative rule OAR 437-001-0744(3)(d) and (e).
- Develop protocols for communicating with students, families and staff who have come into close contact with a person who has COVID-19.
 - The definition of exposure is being within 6 feet of a person who has COVID-19 for at least
 15 cumulative minutes in a day.
 - OSHA has developed a model notification policy.
- Develop protocols for communicating immediately with staff, families, and the school community
 when a new case(s) of COVID-19 is diagnosed in students or staff members, including a description
 of how the school or district is responding.
- Periodic interval training also keeps the vigilance to protocols ever present when fatigue and changing circumstances might result in reduced adherence to guidance.
- Provide all information in languages and formats accessible to the school community.

Public Health Communication and Training:

The school administration will communicate to staff, students, and school families at the start of On-Site instruction and at periodic intervals the infection control measures being implemented to prevent spread of disease (see the *GPAS Communicable Disease Management Plan*).

Initial training will be offered to all staff prior to being in-person in any instructional model through all staff webinar, narrated slide decks, online video, using professional learning communities, or mailing handouts with discussion. Periodic interval training will also offered.

The "COVID-19 Hazards Poster," provided by Oregon OSHA will be posted in a conspicuous manner in a central location where employees can be expected to see it. Employees working remotely will be provided with a copy of the COVID-19 Hazards Poster through electronic or equally effective means.

A copy of the "Masks Required" sign developed by the Oregon Health Authority will be posted in areas where masks, face coverings, or face shields are required.

Protocols will be developed for communicating with students, families and staff who have come into close contact with a person who has COVID-19.

An exposure is defined as an individual who has close contact (less than 6 feet) for longer than 15 cumulative minutes in a day with a person who has COVID-19 case.

Protocols will also be developed for communicating immediately with staff, families, and the school community when a new case(s) of COVID-19 is diagnosed in students or staff members, including a description of how the school or district is responding.

The school administration will update the Communicable Disease Management Plan with communication protocols as needed.

Requirements for 1f. ENTRY AND SCREENING

- Direct students and staff to stay home if they have COVID-19 symptoms. COVID-19 symptoms are as follows:
 - Primary symptoms of concern: cough, fever (temperature of 100.4°F or higher) or chills, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, or new loss of taste or smell.
 - Note that muscle pain, headache, sore throat, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, new nasal congestion, and runny nose are also symptoms often associated with COVID-19. More information about COVID-19 symptoms is available <u>from CDC</u>.
 - In addition to COVID-19 symptoms, students must be excluded from school for signs of other infectious diseases, per existing school policy and protocols. See pages 9-11 of OHA/ODE <u>Communicable Disease Guidance for Schools</u>.
 - Emergency signs that require immediate medical attention:
 - Trouble breathing
 - Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
 - New confusion or inability to awaken
 - Bluish lips or face (lighter skin); greyish lips or face (darker skin)
 - Other severe symptoms

- Screen all elementary grade students for symptoms on-site every day. This can be done visually
 as well as asking students and staff about any new symptoms or close contact with someone
 with COVID-19. For students, confirmation from a parent/caregiver or guardian can also be
 appropriate. Secondary students must also be screened every day. This can be done off-site, prior
 to coming to school.
- Staff members can self-screen and attest to their own health, but regular reminders of the importance of daily screening must be provided to staff.⁴
 - Anyone displaying or reporting the primary symptoms of concern must be isolated (see section 1i) and sent home as soon as possible. <u>See table "Planning for COVID-19</u> Scenarios in Schools."
 - o Additional guidance for nurses and health staff.
- Follow LPHA advice on restricting from school any student or staff known to have been exposed (e.g., by a household member) to COVID-19. <u>See "Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools"</u> and the COVID-19 Exclusion Summary Guide.
- Staff or students with a chronic or baseline cough that has worsened or is not well-controlled
 with medication must be excluded from school. Do not exclude staff or students who have other
 symptoms that are chronic or baseline symptoms (e.g., asthma, allergies, etc.) from school. See
 the COVID-19 Exclusion Summary Guide.
- Hand hygiene on entry to school every day: wash with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.

Entry and Screening: Students and staff that have an illness with at least one primary COVID-19 symptom in the last 10 days will be excluded from school. Any person that has an illness with at least one primary COVID-19 symptom in the last 10 days will not be admitted on campus.

COVID-19 primary symptoms of concern include: cough, fever (temperature of 100.4°F or higher) or chills, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, or new loss of taste or smell.

Muscle pain, headache, sore throat, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, new nasal congestion, and runny nose are also symptoms often associated with COVID-19.

Students will also be excluded from school for signs of other infectious diseases, per existing school policy and protocols.

All elementary students and staff will be screened for symptoms on-site every day. This will be done visually as well as asking students and staff about any new symptoms or close contact with someone with COVID-19. For students, confirmation from a parent/caregiver or guardian can also be appropriate. Staff members can self-screen and attest to their own health and regular reminders of the importance of daily screening will be provided to the staff.

⁴ Self-screening of adult staff members can be efficient but also problematic if not held to the highest of standards and building a culture where staff don't sign-in when they have symptoms that should have them staying or working from home

When the screening indicates that a student may be symptomatic, the student will be directed to the office, where established protocols from the CDP will be followed. (See section 1a).

Anyone displaying or reporting the primary symptoms of concern will be isolated (see section 1i of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance) and sent home as soon as possible.

All students in preschool, grades 3-5, and grades 6-8 with an outside doors will utilize that entrance. The classroom teacher will conduct a visual screen for the appearance of symptoms. Students in grades K-2 will enter through the main door and a staff member will conduct the visual screening for symptoms.

Hand-sanitizers will be placed by each entrance prior to student entrance to classes, or students will utilize classroom stations to wash hands.

Any student or staff known to have been exposed (e.g., by a household member) to COVID-19 shall not be allowed on campus until the passage of 14 calendar days after exposure and until symptoms (e.g., fever, cough, shortness of breath, sore throat, headache) are improving. See "Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools" and the COVID-19 Exclusion Summary Guide.

Students or staff with a chronic or baseline cough that has worsened or is not well-controlled with medication will be excluded from school. Students or staff who have other symptoms that are chronic or baseline symptoms (e.g., asthma, allergies, etc.) will not be excluded from school.

Parents/guardians can provide information regarding existing conditions that cause coughing to be utilized for the purpose of screening, as previously existing coughs that are not worsening are not considered symptomatic of COVID-19.

Requirements for 1g. VISITORS/VOLUNTEERS

- Restrict non-essential visitors/volunteers.
 - Examples of essential visitors include: DHS Child Protective Services, Law Enforcement, etc.
 - Examples of non-essential visitors/volunteers include: Parent Teacher Association (PTA), classroom volunteers, etc.
- Diligently screen all visitors/volunteers for symptoms and ask questions about symptoms and any close contact with someone diagnosed with COVID-19 upon every entry. Restrict from school property any visitor known to have been exposed to COVID-19. See the <u>COVID-19</u> Exclusion Summary Guide.
- Visitors/volunteers must wash or sanitize their hands upon entry and exit.
- Visitors/volunteers must maintain 6 feet of physical distancing, wear face coverings, and adhere to all other provisions of this guidance.

Plan Details for 1g.

Please enter the details of your On-Site or Hybrid plan that correspond to the requirements listed above:

Visitors/Volunteers: Visitors/Volunteers will be unable to work in the school or complete other volunteer activities that require in-person interaction at this time. Adults in the school building are limited to essential personnel only.

All visitors/volunteers will be screened for symptoms and asked questions about symptoms and any close contact with someone diagnosed with COVID-19 upon every entry. Any visitor known to have been exposed to COVID-19 will be restricted from school property. See the COVID-19 Exclusion Summary Guide.

Visitors/volunteers must wash or sanitize their hands upon entry and exit.

Visitors/volunteers must maintain six-foot distancing, wear face coverings, and adhere to all other provisions of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance.

Requirements for 1h. FACE COVERINGS, FACE SHIELDS, AND CLEAR PLASTIC BARRIERS

- Employers are required to provide masks, face coverings, or face shields for all staff, contractors, other service providers, visitors and volunteers.
- Face coverings or face shields for all staff, contractors, other service providers, visitors or
 volunteers informed by <u>CDC guidelines for Face Coverings</u>. Individuals may remove their face
 coverings while working alone in private offices. Face shields are an acceptable alternative only
 when a person has a medical condition that prevents them from wearing a mask or face covering,
 when people need to see mouth and tongue motions in order to communicate, or when an
 individual is speaking to an audience for a short period of time and clear communication is
 otherwise not possible.
- Face coverings or face shields for all students in grades Kindergarten and up following <u>CDC</u> <u>guidelines for Face Coverings</u>. Face shields are an acceptable alternative only when a student has a medical condition that prevents them from wearing a mask or face covering, or when people need to see the student's mouth and tongue motions in order to communicate.
- Face coverings should be worn both indoors and outdoors, including during outdoor recess.
- "Group mask breaks" or "full classroom mask breaks" are not allowed. If a student removes a face covering, or demonstrates a need to remove the face covering for a short-period of time:
 - Provide space well away from peers while the face covering is removed. In the classroom setting, an example could be a designated chair where a student can sit and take a 15 minute or less "sensory break;"
 - Students must not be left alone or unsupervised;
 - Designated area or chair must be appropriately distanced from other students and of a material that is easily wiped down for disinfection after each use;
 - o Provide additional instructional supports to effectively wear a face covering;
 - Provide students adequate support to re-engage in safely wearing a face covering;
 - Students cannot be discriminated against or disciplined for an inability to safely wear a face covering.
- Face masks⁵ for school RNs or other medical personnel when providing direct contact care and monitoring of staff/students displaying symptoms. School nurses shall also wear appropriate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for their role.
 - Additional guidance for nurses and health staff.

⁵ Face masks refer to medical-grade face masks in this document. RNs and other healthcare providers should refer to OHA for updated information.

Accommodations under ADA or IDEA and providing FAPE while attending to Face Covering Guidance

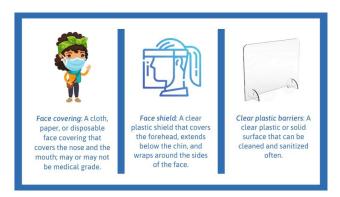
- If any student requires an accommodation to meet the requirement for face coverings, districts and schools must limit the student's proximity to students and staff to the extent possible to minimize the possibility of exposure. Appropriate accommodations could include:
 - Offering different types of face coverings and face shields that may meet the needs of the student.
 - Spaces away from peers while the face covering is removed; students must not be left alone or unsupervised.
 - Short periods of the educational day that do not include wearing the face covering,
 while following the other health strategies to reduce the spread of disease.
 - Additional instructional supports to effectively wear a face covering.
- For students with existing medical conditions and a physician's orders to not wear face coverings, or other health related concerns, schools/districts **must not** deny any in-person instruction.
- Schools and districts must comply with the established IEP/504 plan prior to the closure of inperson instruction in March of 2020, or the current plan in effect for the student if appropriately developed after March of 2020.
 - If a student eligible for, or receiving services under a 504/IEP, cannot wear a face covering due to the nature of the disability, the school or district must:
 - 1. Review the 504/IEP to ensure access to instruction in a manner comparable to what was originally established in the student's plan including on-site instruction with accommodations or adjustments.
 - 2. Not make placement determinations solely on the inability to wear a face covering.
 - 3. Include updates to accommodations and modifications to support students in plans.
 - For students protected under ADA/IDEA, who abstain from wearing a face covering, or students whose families determine the student will not wear a face covering, the school or district must:
 - 1. Review the 504/IEP to ensure access to instruction in a manner comparable to what was originally established in the student's plan.
 - 2. The team must determine that the disability is not prohibiting the student from meeting the requirement.
 - If the team determines that the disability is prohibiting the student from meeting the requirement, follow the requirements for students eligible for, or receiving services under, a 504/IEP who cannot wear a face covering due to the nature of the disability,
 - If a student's 504/IEP plan included supports/goals/instruction for behavior or social emotional learning, the school team must evaluate the student's plan prior to providing instruction through Comprehensive Distance Learning.
 - 3. Hold a 504/IEP meeting to determine equitable access to educational opportunities which may include limited in-person instruction, on-site instruction with accommodations, or Comprehensive Distance Learning.
- For students not currently served under an IEP or 504, districts must consider whether or not student inability to consistently wear a face covering or face shield as required is due to a disability. Ongoing inability to meet this requirement may be evidence of the need for an evaluation to determine eligibility for support under IDEA or Section 504.

• If a staff member requires an accommodation for the face covering or face shield requirements, districts and schools shall work to limit the staff member's proximity to students and staff to the extent possible to minimize the possibility of exposure.

Face Coverings, Face Shields, and Clear Plastic Barriers:



Face coverings or Face shields: Face coverings or face shields are required for all students in grades kindergarten and above along with all staff, contractors, other service providers, visitors, and volunteers. Individuals may remove their face coverings while working alone in private offices or when separated by more than 6 feet in outside learning spaces.

Face masks, face coverings, or face shields will be provided for all staff, contractors, other service providers, visitors, and volunteers as needed.

Face coverings should be worn both indoors and outdoors, including during outdoor recess. It is **recommended** that if face coverings are worn, they should be washed daily or a new covering worn daily.

Group mask breaks" or "full classroom mask breaks" are not allowed.

Face masks are required for school medical personnel when providing direct contact care and monitoring of staff/students displaying symptoms. School medical personnel shall also wear appropriate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for their role.

If a student removes a face covering or demonstrates a need to remove the face covering for a short period of time, school staff will:

- Provide space away from peers while the face covering is removed. Students will not be left alone or unsupervised.
- Provide additional instructional supports to effectively wear a face covering.
- Provide students adequate support to re-engage in safely wearing a face-covering.
- Provide short periods of time in the educational day that do not include wearing the face covering while following the other health strategies to reduce the spread of disease.

Students with existing medical conditions, doctor's orders to not wear face coverings, or other health related concerns will not be denied access to on-site instruction.

Comprehensive Distance Learning may be an option for students who abstain from wearing a face covering, or students whose families determine the student will not wear a face covering during On-site instruction.

For students with educational accommodation/modification plans who cannot wear a face covering due to the nature of the disability, the school will:

- Review the plan to ensure access to instruction in a manner comparable to what was originally
 established in the student's plan, including on-site instruction with
 accommodations/adjustments as needed.
- Not determine placement solely on the inability to wear a face covering.
- Update the plan to support students.

For students not currently under an IEP or 504, the school will consider whether or not the student's inability to consistently wear a face covering or face shield as required is due to a disability. Ongoing inability to meet this requirement may be evidence of the need for an evaluation to determine eligibility for support under IDEA or Section 504.

Children under the age of 5 or not yet in kindergarten should not wear a face covering. Children of any age should not wear a face covering:

- If they have a medical condition that makes it difficult for them to breathe with a face covering;
- If they experience a disability that prevents them from wearing a face covering;
- If they are unable to remove the face covering independently;
- Or While sleeping.

Requirements for 1i. ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE

- Protocols for exclusion and isolation for sick students and staff whether identified at the time of bus pick-up, arrival to school, or at any time during the school day.
- Protocols for screening students, as well as exclusion and isolation protocols for sick students
 and staff identified at the time of arrival or during the school day. See the <u>COVID-19 Exclusion</u>
 Summary Guide.
 - O Work with school nurses, health care providers, or other staff with expertise to determine necessary modifications to areas where staff/students will be isolated. If two students present COVID-19 symptoms at the same time, they must be isolated at once. If separate rooms are not available, ensure that 6 feet distance is maintained. Do not assume they have the same illness. Consider if and where students and staff will be isolated during learning outside. Create a comfortable outdoor area for isolation or follow plan for in building isolation.
 - o Consider required physical arrangements to reduce risk of disease transmission.

- Plan for the needs of generally well students who need medication or routine treatment, as well as students who may show signs of illness.
- Additional guidance for nurses and health staff for providing care to students with complex needs.
- Students and staff who report or develop symptoms must be isolated in a designated isolation
 area in the school or outside learning space, with adequate space and staff supervision and
 symptom monitoring by a school nurse, other school-based health care provider or school staff
 until they are able to go home. Anyone providing supervision and symptom monitoring must
 wear appropriate face covering or face shields.
 - School nurses and health staff in close contact with symptomatic individuals (less than 6 feet) must wear a medical-grade face mask. Other Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) may be needed depending on symptoms and care provided. Consult a nurse or health care professional regarding appropriate use of PPE. Any PPE used during care of a symptomatic individual must be properly removed and disposed of prior to exiting the care space.
 - After removing PPE, hands shall be immediately cleaned with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, hands can be cleaned with an alcoholbased hand sanitizer that contains 60-95% alcohol.
 - o If able to do so safely, a symptomatic individual shall wear a face covering.
 - To reduce fear, anxiety, or shame related to isolation, provide a clear explanation of procedures, including use of PPE and handwashing.
- Establish procedures for safely transporting anyone who is sick to their home or to a health care facility.
- Staff and students who are ill must stay home from school and must be sent home if they
 become ill at school, particularly if they have COVID-19 symptoms. Refer to table in <u>"Planning</u>
 for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools."
- Involve school nurses, School Based Health Centers, or staff with related experience (Occupational or Physical Therapists) in development of protocols and assessment of symptoms (where staffing exists).
- Record and monitor the students and staff being isolated or sent home for the LPHA review.
- The school must provide a remote learning option for students who are required to be temporarily off-site for isolation and quarantine.

Isolation Measures:

The staff will refer to the *GPAS Communicable Disease Management Plan* for appropriate isolation determination and processes. See the <u>COVID-19 Exclusion Summary Guide</u>.

All students who become ill at school with excludable symptoms will remain at school supervised by staff until parents can pick them up in the designated isolation area or outside learning space. The student will be provided a facial covering (if they can safely wear one). The staff should wear a facial covering or face shield and maintain physical distancing, but never leave a child unattended.

If two students present COVID-19 symptoms at the same time, they will be isolated at once. If separate rooms are not available, six feet distance will be maintained in the isolation area.

While exercising caution to maintain (ensure) safety is appropriate when working with children exhibiting symptoms, it is also critical that staff maintain sufficient composure and disposition so as not to unduly worry a student or family.

Staff will maintain student confidentiality as appropriate.

Daily logs must be maintained containing the following:

- Name of the students sent home for illness, cause of illness, time of onset, as per designated communicable disease surveillance logs; and
- Name of the students visiting the office for illness symptoms, even if not sent home, as per routine health logs.

Staff and students who are ill must stay home from school and must be sent home if they become ill at school, particularly if they have COVID-19 symptoms.

Staff, students, and essential volunteers with known or suspected COVID-19 cannot remain at school and should return only after their symptoms resolve and they are physically ready to return to school. In no case can they return before:

- the passage of 14 calendar days after exposure; and
- symptoms have been resolved for 72 hours without the use of anti-fever medications.

The school will provide a remote learning option for students who are required to be temporarily offsite for isolation and guarantine.

Facilities and School Operations (Section 2 of the RSSL Guidance)

Some activities and areas will have a higher risk for spread (e.g., band, choir, science labs, and locker rooms). When engaging in these activities within the school setting, schools will need to consider additional physical distancing or conduct the activities outside (where feasible). Additionally, schools should consider sharing explicit risk statements for instructional and extra-curricular activities requiring additional considerations (see section 5f of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance).

Requirements for 2a. ENROLLMENT

(Note: Section 2a does not apply to private schools.)

- Enroll all students (including foreign exchange students) following the standard Oregon Department of Education guidelines.
- The temporary suspension of the 10-day drop rule does not change the rules for the initial enrollment date for students:
 - The ADM enrollment date for a student is the first day of the student's actual attendance.

- A student with fewer than 10 days of absence at the beginning of the school year may be counted in membership prior to the first day of attendance, but not prior to the first calendar day of the school year.
- If a student does not attend during the first 10 session days of school, the student's
 ADM enrollment date must reflect the student's actual first day of attendance.
- Students who were anticipated to be enrolled, but who do not attend at any time must not be enrolled and submitted in ADM.
- If a student has stopped attending for 10 or more days, districts must continue to try to engage the student. At a minimum, districts must attempt to contact these students and their families weekly to either encourage attendance or receive confirmation that the student has transferred or has withdrawn from school. This includes students who were scheduled to start the school year, but who have not yet attended.
- When enrolling a student from another school, schools must request documentation from the
 prior school within 10 days of enrollment per OAR 581-021-0255 to make all parties aware of
 the transfer. Documentation obtained directly from the family does not relieve the school of this
 responsibility. After receiving documentation from another school that a student has enrolled,
 drop that student from your roll.
- Design attendance policies to account for students who do not attend in-person due to student or family health and safety concerns.
- When a student has a pre-excused absence or COVID-19 absence, the school district must reach out to offer support at least weekly until the student has resumed their education.
- When a student is absent beyond 10 days and meets the criteria for continued enrollment due
 to the temporary suspension of the 10 day drop rule, continue to count them as absent for
 those days and include those days in your Cumulative ADM reporting.

Requirements for 2b. ATTENDANCE

(Note: Section 2b does not apply to private schools.)

- Grades K-5 (self-contained): Attendance must be taken at least once per day for all students enrolled in school, regardless of the instructional model (On-Site, Hybrid, Comprehensive Distance Learning, online schools).
- Grades 6-12 (individual subject): Attendance must be taken at least once for each scheduled class that day for all students enrolled in school, regardless of the instructional model (On-Site, Hybrid, Comprehensive Distance Learning, online schools).
- Alternative Programs: Some students are reported in ADM as enrolled in a non-standard program (such as tutorial time), with hours of instruction rather than days present and days absent. Attendance must be taken at least once for each scheduled interaction with each student, so that local systems can track the student's attendance and engagement.
 Reported hours of instruction continue to be those hours in which the student was present.

- Online schools that previously followed a two check-in per week attendance process must follow the Comprehensive Distance Learning requirements for checking and reporting attendance.
- Provide families with clear and concise descriptions of student attendance and participation
 expectations as well as family involvement expectations that take into consideration the

The school will continue Google Classroom work to facilitate continuous learning experiences that occur on-site and in a distance learning setting (off-site); include options for digital learning and provision for non-digital distance learning where Internet and computers will not be available.

Families will be surveyed to collect information about the number, type, and condition of devices used in their homes to support distance learning.

Arrival and Dismissal: Because the parents provide the transportation of students to and from school, students may arrive anytime between 7:30-8:00 AM and leave campus anytime between 3:15-3:45 PM.

Students will maintain a distance of six feet when entering and exiting the building. When arriving/leaving students must come from and go directly to their designated vehicle for transport. Parents/drivers will follow the school's drop-off/pick-up procedures and remain in or around their own vehicle to maintain social distancing. Drop-off/pick-up interactions need to be kept as brief as possible.

Upon arrival, students will go directly to their classroom. All students except grades K-2 will enter and exit from their classroom outside door. Students in grades K-2 will enter and exit from the lower grades STREAM classroom outside door.

All students must use hand-sanitizer/wash hands upon entry and exit.

Hand sanitizer will be available at entry/exit points.

Upon entering, the staff will conduct visual screenings at each entry point (see section 1f) and track cohort data. Staff will use a sign-in/sign-out protocol to help facilitate contact tracing.

The playground and gym will not be available before school begins or after dismissal by students or their siblings and friends.

- Seating: Rearrange student desks and other seat spaces so that students' physical bodies are at least 3 feet apart; or at least 6 feet apart, as required in section 1c; assign seating so students are in the same seat at all times. Seating will be assigned so students are in the same seat at all times. Where possible, all student desks will face the same direction or students will sit on only one side of tables.
- Materials: Each classroom will limit the sharing of community supplies when possible (e.g., scissors, pencils, etc.). If needed to share, these items will be cleaned frequently. Hand sanitizer and tissues will be available for use by students and staff.

Playgrounds, Fields, Recess, Breaks, and Restrooms:

The playground will remain closed to the general public, family members of students, and visitors until park playground equipment and benches reopen in the community for public use. Classes/cohorts may use the playground for recess on a staggered scheduled throughout the school day.

After using the restroom, students must wash their hands with soap and water for 20 seconds.

Before and after going to recess/PE, students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol. Before and after using playground, outdoor, or gym equipment, students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.

Playground equipment, outdoor equipment (including sports equipment), gym equipment, and shared equipment will be designated solely for the use of one cohort at a time. Outdoor playground structures will receive normal routine cleaning and do not require disinfection. Shared equipment (balls, jump ropes, etc.) will be cleaned and disinfected at least daily or between cohorts use as much as possible, in accordance with CDC guidance.

Cleaning and disinfecting requirements will be maintained. (See section 3j and the *GPAS Communicable Disease Management Plan* for cleaning procedures.)

Recess and PE activities will be planned to support physical distancing and maintain stable cohorts. This can include limiting the number of students on one piece of equipment, at one game, etc.

Classes may use the gym for recess/PE if/when available. If the gym is not available, students can have recess in their classroom.

Staff rooms, common staff lunch areas, and workspaces will be limited to single person usage at a time, maintaining six feet of distance between adults.

Requirements for 2h. MEAL SERVICE/NUTRITION

- Maintain 6 feet of physical distancing when masks cannot be worn, including when eating.
- Include meal services/nutrition staff in planning for school reentry.
- Prohibit self-service buffet-style meals.
- Prohibit sharing of food and drinks among students and/or staff.
- At designated meal or snack times, students may remove their face coverings to eat or drink but must maintain 6 feet of physical distance from others, and must put face coverings back on after finishing the meal or snack.
- Staff serving meals and students interacting with staff at mealtimes must wear face coverings (see section 1h). Staff must maintain 6 feet of physical distance to the greatest extent possible. - Appropriate daily cleaning of meal items (e.g., plates, utensils, transport items).
- Cleaning and sanitizing of meal touch-points and meal counting system between stable cohorts.
- Adequate cleaning and disinfection of tables between meal periods.
- Since staff must remove their face coverings during eating and drinking, limit the number of
 employees gathering in shared spaces. Restrict use of shared spaces such as conference rooms
 and break rooms by limiting occupancy or staggering use. Consider staggering times for staff
 breaks, to prevent congregation in shared spaces. Always maintain at least 6 feet of physical
 distancing. Wear face coverings except when eating or drinking and minimize time in spaces
 where face coverings are not consistently worn.

Meal Service/Nutrition:

Six feet of physical distancing will be maintained when masks cannot be worn, including when eating.

Staff serving meals and students interacting with staff at mealtimes must wear face coverings. Staff must maintain 6 feet of physical distance to the greatest extent possible. If students are eating in a classroom, staff may supervise from the doorway of the classroom if feasible.

Students and staff must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol before and after meals. If possible, students will wash hands in the classroom. If not, hallway and restroom procedures previously listed will be followed.

If offered, hot lunches will be carefully supervised until COVID-19 restrictions are lifted. All staff will be trained on meal service requirements. Pre-plated meals or snacks may be available.

All meals will be eaten in the classroom or outdoors for grades 3-8. All meals will be eaten in the Commons or outdoors for grades K-2.

Self-service buffet-style meals are prohibited. Sharing of food and drinks among students and/or staff is also prohibited.

At designated meal or snack times, students may remove their face coverings to eat or drink but must maintain six feet of physical distance from others, and must put their face coverings back on after finishing the meal or snack.

Students in grades K-2 will pick up food at the kitchen service deck and eat at tables in the Commons. Students in grades 3-8 will pick up food at the kitchen service deck and return to their classrooms to eat. Physical distancing requirements will be maintained in transit. If a classroom is unable to travel to the kitchen, kitchen staff will deliver meals to that classroom.

Students will not share utensils or other items during meals. Each table/desk will be cleaned and disinfected prior to meals being consumed.

Tables/desks will be cleaned and disinfected between meal periods. Meal touch-points will be cleaned and sanitized between stable cohorts.

Requirements for 2i. TRANSPORTATION

- Include transportation departments (and associated contracted providers, if used) in planning for return to service.
- Buses are cleaned frequently. Conduct targeted cleanings between routes, with a focus on disinfecting frequently touched surfaces of the bus (see section 2j).
- Staff must use hand sanitizer (containing between 60-95% alcohol) in between helping each child
 and when getting on and off the vehicle. Gloves are not recommended; hand sanitizer is strongly
 preferred. If hand sanitizer is not available, disposable gloves can be used and must be changed
 to a new pair before helping each child.
- Develop protocol for loading/unloading that includes visual screening for students exhibiting symptoms and logs for contact-tracing. This must be done at the time of arrival and departure.
 - If a student displays COVID-19 symptoms, provide a face covering (unless they are already wearing one) and keep 6 feet away from others. Continue transporting the student.
 - The symptomatic student shall be seated in the first row of the bus during transportation, and multiple windows must be opened to allow for fresh air circulation, if feasible.
 - The symptomatic student shall leave the bus first. After all students exit the bus, the seat and surrounding surfaces must be cleaned and disinfected.
 - If arriving at school, notify staff to begin isolation measures.
 - If transporting for dismissal and the student displays an onset of symptoms, notify the school.
- Consult with parents/guardians of students who may require additional support (e.g., students who experience a disability and require specialized transportation as a related service) to appropriately provide service.

- Per federal guidance, drivers must wear properly fitting face coverings at all times. A face shield
 or goggles may be worn to supplement a properly fitting face covering. Please refer to the CDC
 order.
- Inform parents/guardians of practical changes to transportation service (i.e., physical distancing at bus stops and while loading/unloading, potential for increased route time due to additional precautions, sanitizing practices, and face coverings).
- Face coverings for all students, applying the guidance in section 1h to transportation settings. This prevents eating while on the bus.
- Take all possible actions to maximize ventilation: Dress warmly, keep vents and windows open to the greatest extent possible.

Transportation: Students will be individually transported by their family or by individual family arranged cars. No buses or public transportation will be used to transport students.

Students will be dropped off in the parking lot and come directly into the school. Parents will remain in their vehicle.

Students will be dismissed by the teacher and picked up in the parking lot. Parents will remain in their vehicle. The teacher may communicate with parents while they are in the vehicle, maintaining social distancing and wearing a face covering or a face shield. Teachers will supervise the pick-up areas to ensure students are adhering to distancing guidelines.

Except for grades K-2, students will enter and exit school through their classroom outside door. Students in grades K-2 will enter and exit school through from the lower grades STREAM classroom outside door.

Upon arrival, staff members will conduct a health screening of all students prior to their entering the school building. Once class has begun, tardy students in grades K-2 will be screened in the front office area. Students in the other classrooms will still be screened at the outside door of their classroom when arriving late. Logs of health screening will be kept for a minimum of 4 weeks.

Requirements for 2j. CLEANING, DISINFECTION, AND VENTILATION

- Clean, sanitize, and disinfect frequently touched surfaces (e.g. door handles, sink
 handles, drinking fountains, transport vehicles) and shared objects (e.g., toys, games, art
 supplies) between uses multiple times per day. Maintain clean and disinfected (<u>CDC</u>
 <u>guidance</u>) environments, including classrooms, cafeteria settings and restrooms. Provide
 time and supplies for the cleaning and disinfecting of high-touch surfaces between
 multiple student uses, even in the same cohort.
- Outdoor learning spaces must have at least 75% of the square footage of its sides open for airflow.

- Schools with HVAC systems must evaluate the system to minimize indoor air recirculation (thus maximizing fresh outdoor air) to the extent possible. Schools that do not have mechanical ventilation systems shall, to the extent possible, increase natural ventilation by opening windows and interior doors before students arrive and after students leave, and while students are present. - Facilities must be cleaned and disinfected at least daily to prevent transmission of the virus from surfaces (see <u>CDC's guidance on disinfecting public spaces</u>).
- Consider modification or enhancement of building ventilation where feasible (see <u>CDC's</u> <u>guidance on ventilation and filtration</u> and <u>American Society of Heating, Refrigerating, and Air-Conditioning Engineers' guidance</u>).

Ventilation systems will be checked and maintained. Ventilation procedures will be used to increase the circulation of outdoor air as much as possible by opening windows and doors, using fans, and through other methods. HVAC filters will be maintained and replaced as necessary to ensure proper functioning of the system.

Health Services:

Isolation of Students: Students or staff who become sick or show signs of illness on campus will be isolated to the infirmary room located in the school office. This space will be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected between each use. Students will be supervised until their parent arrives to pick them up. Supervising staff will maintain a safe distance while visibly being able to monitor the student. The school will collaborate with the LPHA as needed.

 - At least 30 minutes in each school month must be used to instruct students on the emergency procedures for fires, earthquakes (including tsunami drills in appropriate zones), and safety threats.
 - Fire drills must be conducted monthly.
 - Earthquake drills (including tsunami drills and instruction for schools in a tsunami hazard zone) must be conducted two times a year.
 - Safety threats including procedures related to lockdown, lockout, shelter in place and evacuation and other appropriate actions to take when there is a threat to safety must be conducted two times a year.
- Drills can and should be carried out <u>as close as possible</u> to the procedures that would be used in an actual emergency. For example, a fire drill must be carried out with the same alerts and same routes as normal. If appropriate and practicable, COVID-19 physical distancing measures can be implemented, but only if they do not compromise the drill.
- When or if physical distancing must be compromised, drills must be completed in less than 15 minutes.
- Drills shall not be practiced unless they can be practiced correctly.
- Train staff on safety drills prior to students arriving on the first day on campus in hybrid or face-to-face engagement.
- If on a hybrid schedule, conduct multiple drills each month to ensure that all cohorts of students have opportunities to participate in drills (i.e., schedule on different cohort days throughout the year).
- Students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol after a drill is complete.

School Emergency Procedures and Drills:

Fire, earthquake, lockdown, secure, shelter in place, evacuation, and other essential emergency drills will continue to take place on a regular schedule. If physical distancing must be compromised, drills must be completed in less than 15 minutes. Students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol after the drill has been completed.

- Be proactive in planning for known behavioral escalations (e.g., self-harm, spitting, scratching, biting, eloping, failure to maintain physical distance). Adjust antecedents where possible to minimize student and staff dysregulation. Recognize that there could be new and different antecedents and setting events with the additional requirements and expectations for the 2020-21 school year.
- Establish a proactive plan for daily routines designed to build self-regulation skills; self-regulation skill-building sessions can be short (5-10 minutes), and should take place at times when the student is regulated and/or is not demonstrating challenging behaviors.
- Ensure all staff are trained to support de-escalation, provide lagging skill instruction, and implement alternatives to restraint and seclusion.
- Ensure that staff are trained in effective, evidence-based methods for developing and
 maintaining their own level of self-regulation and resilience to enable them to remain calm and
 able to support struggling students as well as colleagues.
- Ensure that spaces that are unexpectedly used to deescalate behaviors are appropriately cleaned and sanitized after use before the introduction of other stable cohorts to that space.

Response Protocol: GPAS will work in coordination with the Oregon Conference of Seventh day Adventists and the LPHA to follow the GPAS Communicable Disease Management Plan and follow the newest version of the ODE's **Ready Schools**, **Safe Learners** guidance document.

Reporting: If anyone who has been on campus is known to have been diagnosed with COVID-19, a report will be made to the LPHA and the LPHA will be consulted regarding cleaning and possible classroom or program closure.

Any cluster of illness (2 or more people with similar illness) among staff or students will be reported to the LPHA.

When cases are identified in the school, a response team will be assembled to assign necessary responsibilities.
